FLORIDA ADVENTURE

Three AM, February 21, 2004!!! Who gets up at this ungodly hour? Marianne Badala. Marie Kelleher and I did, so we could make the seven AM plane to Fort Myers, Florida. OK. It's just one morning. Fool! Fool!! We were on our way to spend a week trying to find some of those great bird pictures. Our tour leader, John Cang who introduced us to Bob, a geologist from California, the fourth member of the tour, met us at the Fort Myers airport. Off we went to our Motel Six rooms.

John announced that the following morning we would leave the motel (after having breakfast in our rooms) at 6:30 AM. Well OK, we know the birds

get up early. Little did we realize that 6:30 AM would be the latest we would leave our motel for the rest of the tour. Five to five thirty

would be the regular "take off" time. Each day we went searching out the birds. We traveled in a van, to Sanabel, to a couple of rookeries, to Shark Valley, to Mrs. Jones's front yard (an osprey nest), to the front of a Library where the burrowing owls live—wherever, the birds were we were there rain or shine. At Mrs. Jones's we sat in portable chairs waiting for the daddy osprey to return hoping he would be flying toward us with fish dinner. Unfortunately, the wind was from the wrong direction and he showed us his back. We went to an area where pelicans and wood storks nest. We were to go out on a boat to get close to the island they nested on, but it was too cold and the water was too choppy. We were able to get some shots on the dock. Almost every day late in the afternoon we went to an eagle's nest hoping to get a shot of the papa eagle delivering dinner to his family in great light. Unfortunately, most days sunset came before he did. One afternoon he had already fed his family before we arrived. We had success as well. We will see how well we used those opportunities in future competitions.

The great thing about traveling with John was that he knew where to find the birds

and when, because of water levels and other factors, there wouldn't be many birds in an area.

He also knew how to get to places without wasting time. How did the effort work out? Well, I have "keeper" slides of eighteen different kinds of birds. Are they all competition slides? No, but the first bird I put in got a six (I'm entering it again) and the "gator," that was sort of a bonus shot, scored an HM. The judges will decide the fate of the others. I know I had an adventure and learned a great deal while traveling with terrific people at ungodly hours.

Do you manipulate?

Over the years we have discussed manipulation of images. Since the beginning of photography, photogs have been changing what the eve sees. When film was a glass plate dipped in a solution of chemicals and then brought into a darkroom, a photographer had the ability to alter reality. Is the use of a lens or even the use of different lens sizes a manipulation? Is film, with its wide variety of speeds, and saturations manipulation? With the use of primitive lenses an early photog can alter a foreground or background with the use of f-stops. He has manipulated what the eye and brain can process. Today cameras can do many more adjustments and compensations then ever before. I can easily say any photog who has a modern camera and knowledge of how to use all the available functions is a manipulator.

Here's a list of questions for all you. Do you use filters? Do you use different lenses? Do you use saturated films? Do you use a wide-open lens to blur a background? Do you clean up a location before you take the photograph? If you answered yes to any of these you are manipulating the image.

Any photographer who thinks cameras and computers should be different entities, I suggest you read about Ansel Adams. He designed a technique called the Zone System. Seventy years ago or so this was as radical as Photoshop is today. If Ansel Adams were alive today he would be a master not only in the darkroom but also with a computer. As for darkrooms, they are a danger to

your health and to the environment. Go to the "Second Sunday Camera Show" or the "Used Dept." at B&H. You will see they can't give enlargers away!

At club meetings I don't hear any complaints if a Kodalith processed image wins. But if an image generated from a computer wins you will here grumbling and moans. Whether that Kodalith was made in a wet darkroom or in a dry darkroom (a.k.a. a computer) the end result is the same. Most of the language used in Photoshop is derived from the wet darkroom, unsharp masking, masking, noise, dodging and burning. We simply accept manipulations that have been prevalent for years and never stop to consider them manipulations I like to say, I collect my ideas

I like to say, I collect my ideas with a camera and show them on paper. Any one who knows how to use film and all their camera functions properly can compete equally with a Photoshop user. A Photoshop user is no different than a wet darkroom photographer.

In closing, a good image regardless of its source, will win any competition. Follow basic rules of photography, read your camera manuals over and over again, get out of bed early and catch the sweet light, put the camera away when the sun is high, keep notes, have fun, learn and change.

Fall Foliage

Kancamagus Highway, New Hampshire

The weekend of October 10th – 12th, 2003 was near the peak of fall foliage up in New Hampshire along the Kancamagus Highway (Route 112 between Lincoln and Conway NH). It is about a 6 hour drive from Ramsey,NJ to Lincoln, NH (which is just off Interstate 93 Exit 12). Once there, you are virtually in the center of the White Mountains National Forest.

The first advice for fall foliage photography anywhere in New England is to get your hotel reservations at least 2-3 months in advance. I waited till the last week and could get no closer than 60 miles away in Concord NH (Comfort Inn, 603-226-4100). Of course, making reservations in advance can be problematic as the peak colors vary year by year. The following websites offer tremendous information to help you plot the peak colors.



Driving East from Lincoln towards Conway you have the East Branch of the Pentqewasset River running parallel to the road. You will want to stop at the various pullouts and walk the short distance to the river to photograph the fast moving river. Make sure you stop at the Otter Rocks Rest Area and walk over to the river. The rocks here jut out into the river allowing you the use of a wide-angle lens for a sweeping view of the river coming right at you.

At the top of the mountain you get to the Kancamagus Pass pullout, which is a nice location for sunrise and sweeping mountain vistas. At this point the road heads downhill and a nice stop is Lily Pond on the left (about 2.5 miles). Though I have never been lucky enough to see any moose, I have been told by locals and other photographers that Lily Pond is frequented by moose in the early morning and early evening.

Continuing further downhill from Lily Pond, the Swift River now runs parallel to the road. Once again, there are frequent pullouts from which there are great scenes to shoot. Pay particular attention to bends in the road where you can get nice S curves when taking pictures of the river.



The Lower Falls Picnic area is another good spot to stop and take pictures. Here rocks form mini waterfalls that can be used as foreground material with the fall colors in the background. other location worth stopping for is the Albany Bridge, which is a 120 foot Paddleford long truss bridge with added arches constructed in 1858.

Best shooting location is to cross the bridge and bear right to the parking lot.


You may want to avoid going into Conway, as the traffic can be quite heavy during the fall. It would be worth turning around and going back on Route 112 W, as the perspective will be different. On the way back to Lincoln, a nice side trip is to go North on the Bear Notch Road. There will be numerous pullouts with very nice sweeping views of the rolling mountains. Follow this route to Bartlett, which is an old railroad station town. The buildings are pretty old and make for some interesting subjects coupled with the peeling paint. The deli just at the corner of Route 302 and Bear Notch Road is excellent if hunger has kicked in. From Bartlett head west along Route 302 and make sure to stop and photograph Flume Cascade.

On the way back to Lincoln, a nice side trip is to go North on the Bear Notch Road. There will be numerous pullouts with very nice sweeping views of the rolling mountains. Follow this route to Bartlett, which



is an old railroad station town. The buildings are pretty old and make for some interesting subjects coupled with the peeling paint. The deli just at the corner of Route 302 and Bear Notch Road is excellent if hunger has kicked in. From Bartlett head west along Route 302 and make sure to stop and photograph Flume Cascade. This is a very thin ribbon of a waterfall that has various levels. You can't miss this as there is a large well paved pullout. A little further is Crawford Notch and Saco Lake, which is a heavy tourist location and popular hiking trail location (Mt. Willard, Webster-Jackson, and Avalon trail heads).

Continue West to Twin Mountain and then head



This Route 3. route will ultimately complete the full circle and bring you back to Lincoln. Along this route are scenic locations such as the Old Man Of the Mountain (sadly it collapsed late 2003), Franconia Notch. Lonesome Lake Trail (a difficult 1000 foot vertical hike), The Basin, Sentinel Pine


Bridge, and Flume Gorge (must pay to get in but worth the moderate hike). The amazing part of this portion of the trip is how much it reminds me of the soaring peaks of Glacier National Park.

Once in Lincoln, there are numerous dinner locations. Some recommendations are the Chowder House, Pancake House, and Tavern At The Mill.

An excellent source map to have is the Delorme New Hampshire Atlas. Along with all 50 states, these guides can be found at Campmor or Ramsey Outdoor. The maps have tremendous details such as waterfalls, covered bridges, topographic/GPS markings, and other landmarks.

So plan ahead and take the trip up to Lincoln NH and feast your eyes on some great fall photography.
