Planning an Autumn Photo Trek by by Gwenn Levine September 27 – October 8, 2001

As many RCC members know, I have gone on week-long photography workshops now and then as a way of honing my skills as a photographer, seeing beautiful places, and setting aside time to actually DO photography. This year I decided to try the same thing on my own. I usually spend the last few days of September in the Adirondacks, where the autumn leaves peak around October 1. This year I decided that I would take a driving tour of New Hampshire, Vermont, and Massachusetts when I left the Adirondacks. Altogether, I was away for eleven nights.

In order to use this time optimally, I had to do some careful planning. First, I noticed an article in *Outdoor Photographer* magazine entitled "Autumn in New England". The article outlined where the peak color was expected from mid-September through the end of October. I structured my trip around the first week of October, since I intended to leave the Adirondacks on October 1. Among the peak areas for that week were the White Mountains in NH, southern farms and villages in VT, and the Berkshire Hills in MA.

Since I subscribe to *Photograph America*, my next step was to order back issues related to autumn in Vermont and New Hampshire. I also went online to websites such as www.newengland.com/foliage, www.yankeefoliage.com, and www.abbington.com. In searching the Internet, I also found www.phototraveler.com. They offered a spiral bound booklet entitled "Autumn in New England". I ordered it for \$11.95 and was very pleased to find excellent detailed routes laid out, including the location of covered bridges (which, ultimately, I did not find to be that photogenic!).

My final step was to go to AAA to pick up maps and guidebooks. Using the materials I had collected, I highlighted a route for myself. Then I went to work, just one month in advance, trying to make motel reservations at end-of-day destination points. Most B&B's, lodges, and AAA motels were already booked. But when I called these facilities and asked for recommendations for inexpensive motels in the area, I received enough suggestions that I was able to make reservations for each night with just two or three calls.

The average cost per night of these motels was \$62; that was pretty good. However, despite the fact that I'm not very fussy, the quality of many of these motels was less than satisfactory. At one motel, the phone didn't work. At another, the a/c cover fell off in the middle of the night and landed on top of a lampshade, where I found it in the morning. Even worse was a little cottage motel where I woke up to a kitchenette floor covered with water – and it hadn't even rained the night before. And worst of all was a rather decent motel where the electrical outlet began to seriously smoke when I was blow-drying my hair! At least I had a roof over my head and indoor plumbing!

If you plan a photo trek like this, I would suggest the following, based on my experience:

- O Make your reservations early and consider staying at one place for 2-3 nights and taking day trips in various directions.
- O Pack compactly so you don't have to "schlep" too many things back and forth from the car.
- O Be sure to have your car in top notch working order so you don't get stranded on isolated (sometimes unpaved) roads between towns in remote areas. Keep a cell phone handy (and charged) for emergencies.
- O Be open about what to photograph. While searching for beautiful trees and waterfalls, I also passed a restored, red 1935 Plymouth with a shiny chrome grill that was gorgeous. I also arrived in Peacham, VT, just before the closing of a crafts sale where about 50 handmade quilts of varying patterns were displayed over the back of pews in a church. Very good subject matter.
- O Be sure to pack your camera bag thoroughly. Bring loads of film (I shot 34 rolls of color slides and three rolls of B&W print), batteries, flash, etc. I also packed a socket wrench to tighten loose tripod joints, a rubber gripper to unscrew tight filters, a shower cap to protect my camera if it rained, a bandana to dry my gear if necessary, and a flashlight.
- O If you generally use an ISO 50 film, bring some faster film or be prepared to push your film on especially windy days. Those leaves do not hold still for long.
- O If you use them, bring a supply of Kodak mailers and large padded envelopes. The postage for multiple rolls is a lot less when you send them all in a single envelope. I sent 14 rolls of film to Kodak the day I left the Adirondacks, another 10 rolls at the midpoint of my trip, and the last 10 rolls as soon as I arrived home. This amount of film represents a big editing job, so it's nice to begin receiving finished slides shortly after returning home rather than waiting two weeks and receiving everything at once.

- O Avoid popular places like Lake Placid, NY, Conway, NH, and Woodstock and Queechee, VT, during this season. They are mobbed with tourists, upscale shops selling things you don't need, and tour buses. Fortunately, the traffic on back roads between such popular destinations was minimal, and certainly the scenery in the surrounding areas was just as beautiful as it was near these hot spots.
- O Be prepared to work out of your car trunk unless you are a very skilled hiker. I found the 24-pound weight of my camera bag and tripod to make hiking difficult, and the teensy shower stalls in some of the motels provided no opportunity to soak sore muscles.
- O Since I wanted to shoot whenever I saw something beautiful, even in the middle of the day, I relied on a polarizer quite a bit. An 81A warming filter should bring out the reds and golds of the autumn leaves. A warming polarizer—even better! Since some scenes caused me to shoot toward the sun, I had to be very careful to shift my position, watch for glare, and shade the lens with my hand or a hat.
- O The weather can be very changeable, so bring layers. I packed turtlenecks, wool sweaters, a wool hat, gloves, a scarf, flannel shirts, and long underwear (based on past experience in the Adirondacks), but I ended up wearing short-sleeve t-shirts almost every day.
- O Farms and deli's along my route supplied enough apples, cheese, yogurt, granola, pasta salads, and sandwiches for me to eat breakfast and lunch in the car.

So create your own adventure with good planning and thorough packing. Have fun!
