
There must be some more of our members that traveled to some nice places. Why don't you share your travel adventures with us.

## "Sicilian Adventure"

It seems my adventures keep getting better. Although I feel as though I have lost my ability to see close ups without glasses, which to no end still frustrates me, however, the depth of my sight keeps increasing with age. My adventure to Sicily was "spectacular." It was everything I wanted it to be and more, which gives me continued positive energy and determination. For the few minutes while landing as I gazed out the window, I could hardly believe my eyes...there was the Tyrrhenian Sea, the mountains and the greenery of Spring seen through the white puffs of clouds. The rugged landscape of sea and land was so picturesque. I was filled with excitement no matter how tired I was.



From the moment we drove away from the airport in Palermo in a stick shift van filled with luggage and camera equipment for 4 very brave ladies, I could feel the enthusiasm in each of us. Our goal was to drive around the island, staying in four different hubs in four entirely different areas of Sicily. We planned our trip a few months prior the very first Sicilian tour for 4 camera club ladies from New York, New Jersey and Massachusetts. We each gathered information on Sicily, purchased road maps and guide books, picked some dates and conferred about our desires and what we wanted to see. I hadn't driven a stick shift vehicle in quite a few years but it all came back and I was no. 2 driver, as Nancy Lamb was no. 1. Nancy managed to go over "earthquakes" (an eruption of the pavement due to severe water erosion) and the narrowest of streets, all on the first day without any sleep! She should be commended for her bravery and skill. I, on the other hand asked for help several times during the trip, one of which resulted in being police escorted to our first B & B, Villa del bosco in a town called Calatafimi. Joan Egan and Pat Gordon became superb navigators, each having a different map to guide us on our journey. As we drove to each destination, Joan would read to us about the history and what we should be looking for. She was also a great translator along the way when no one seemed to understand what we were trying to say. Thank you Joan! It was impossible to see it all, but we really did it all. We found our way with the research we accumulated and then asked questions along the way. Pat was great at asking people for directions and, of course, "Foto please!" Sicilians were more than willing to be in our pictures.

We traveled through many towns: Salemi, while driving to our first B&B, we were escorted to a restaurant by two Sicilian men - one in a small car, the other driving a bus ... and we stopped traffic when our van was stuck on a narrow street; visited the archaeologic ruins of Selinunte, a city by the sea; Sciacca with a seaport along the Mediterranean; Segesta where we toured the beautiful Greek temple built in the 5<sup>th</sup> century BC in the midst of rolling hills; Erice, perched high on top of Monte San Guiliano, which has preserved its medieval character and was a delight to visit; Cefalu on the sea, where I went on a motorcycle to check out our accommodations and where



we captured the sunsets along the sea; Agrigento for a full day of temples, museum and ancient gardens; Montalegro, where we met my relatives and where my photo buddies became dedicated shutterbugs capturing the moments of family reunion; Piazza Armerina, sightseeing and visiting the ancient mosaics at the Villa del Casale; touring the Greek theater in Syracuse; exploring Ortygia and Taormina; and lastly, walking through the city of Catania in the early a.m., photographing the hustle and bustle at the fish market, and then on to Bellini Park with Mt. Etna in the distance.

Our trip was a wonderful experience. No matter what difficulties we encountered, we overcame them. We all had a seeking spirit that lasted throughout our journey. We had a plan each day, and each hub that we stayed at was unique. Meeting and conversing with the people in their daily environment was extremely rewarding. What made our trip so great was that, not only did we each share in the responsibilities of our journey, but we were a group of willing and positive ladies who, together with experience, confidence, mutual respect and determination, found that many of life's quests are possible.
